Smart Growth Plans Take Shape



In the summer of 2005, you may have noticed small groups of residents and local officials walking around town, making notes and suggestions for ways to improve the downtown area. That was the start of Sea Bright's Smart Growth project.

On Feb. 24, 2007, the recommendations of those residents, combined with those of Phillips Preiss Shapiro Associates Inc., N.Y., a planning firm the borough engaged to support the council's plans for future revitalization, were presented to the public.

Municipal planner Diana Marsh, representing Phillips Preiss Shapiro, outlined the suggested improvements, which fall into these general categories:

- **Reassessing the borough's municipal facilities, many of which need significant rehabilitation and/or replacement.**
- **Increasing parking and facilitating vehicle flow to improve pedestrian safety on Ocean Ave.**
- **Improving the boardwalk and sea wall.**
- **Addressing planning and quality of life issues ranging from zoning, open spaces, and recreation facilities, to flooding problems and aesthetics.**

The plan Marsh presented was a draft proposal; the final plan is expected within the next few weeks. At the meeting, Council President Jack Keeler stressed that these plans are in their early, formative stages, and changes will be made as more details and constraints are addressed. The plan was funded by a grant from the New Jersey Office of Smart Growth.

Patricia Spahr: A Taxing Job



The year was 1987. Ronald Reagan was president; Cher won the best actress Oscar for her performance in *Moonstruck*; Hillary Duff was born; and Patricia Spahr began working

for the borough of Sea Bright as a receptionist/typist. Today she is a certified tax/sewer collector. "As a tax collector, I love to say to taxpayers: 'I'll take your money anytime,'" Spahr jokes.

Before she worked for the borough, Spahr, who is Sea Bright born and raised, was a supervisor at the New Jersey Department of Motor Vehicles office in Eatontown, where her most famous customer was Tom Cruise. While working there, she was contacted by then Borough Clerk Mary Larson and Deputy Clerk Patsy Kelly, who offered her the job. "And the rest is history," says Spahr, who just celebrated her 20th anniversary working for Sea Bright.

The biggest changes Spahr has seen over her 20 years on the job involve technology. "Everything is now computerized," she notes. "The town has grown."

In fact, Spahr says the biggest challenges of her career were converting all the borough's tax and finance records to electronic format, and implementing computerized sewer billing.

For Spahr, a typical day consists of helping the public, answering the phones and collecting tax and sewer payments. When "off-duty," she volunteers for Holiday Express, attends Broadway shows, and indulges in Mexican food and pomegranate martinis.

She also is devoted to her family: She has been married for 25 years to Sea Bright Police Captain Steve Spahr and has four sons: Michael, age 24, who works for Merrill Lynch; 20-year-old Michael, who the Spahrs adopted when he was 5, and who just graduated from the Marine Mechanics Institute in Orlando, Fla.; Christopher, age 16, a student at Red Bank Catholic where he excels in academics and sports; and 13-year-old Ryan, a rising baseball star attending Maple Place School.

To those who know her, it's not surprising that, if she didn't work for the Borough of Sea Bright, Spahr's dream job would be "a nurse or social worker," she says.

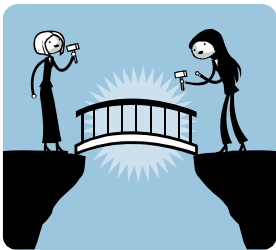
Her compassion for people, and passion for Sea Bright, are hallmarks of her 20-year career.

Sea Bright-Highlands Bridge: Fighting the Good Fight



"We are doing all we can do, short of strapping ourselves to the bridge." That's how Councilwoman Maria Fernandes describes the status of the Sea Bright-Highlands Bridge fight.

The Council continues its unified effort to fight the DOT's plan to build a new four-lane bridge. Council members have met with the DOT and the DEP,

and continue to seek meetings with other Transportation Committee members. An aggressive letter writing and e-mail campaign is ongoing, and the Council is collaborating with Highlands and their independent consultant to, as Borough Attorney Scott Arnette says, "defend and preserve our door to the shore."

Fire Dept. Breathes Easier

The Sea Bright Fire Department has received an Emergency Preparedness and Response Directorate's grant for \$67,830 to purchase new Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA). This Department of Homeland Security program awards funds directly to fire departments and non-affiliated emergency medical service organizations to purchase protective equipment and vehicles.

"This is great news for us here in Sea Bright," says Patrick S. Mason Jr., chief of the Sea Bright Fire Department. "Most of our existing breathing equipment is well over 20 years old."

Exploring A Career In Law Enforcement

Have you ever watched a cop show on TV and wondered what it's really like to be a police officer? Here's your chance to find out. The Sea Bright Police Department is recruiting members for its Police Explorers program, which includes riding with patrol officers, traffic detail, and other police responsibilities. Protect Your Precious Cargo

Are you sure your child's car seat is as safe as it can be? In North and South Beach, the speed limit is reduced from 40 mph to 35 mph, and remains at 30 mph through the center of town. New Pedestrian Crossing signs will be set up along Ocean Avenue, and the limits will be strictly enforced by police.
